2 Main Themes


- Importance of Loyalty and Friendship
 - Harry, Hermione, Ron
 - Sirius, Peter, Remus, James
 - Animagus / looking out for each other
 - Sirius, Peter and the Potters
 - "I would have died..." (Sirius to Peter)
- Injustices of the Legal System: Standing up for the innocent
 - Draco, Lucius, the Committee, Buckbeak
 - Sirius's "crime"
 - Unjust punishment

1 Central Motif

Framing

- Constant plotting of one guilty person / animal / creature after another... then proving each's innocence...
 - Sirius's murders
 - Buckbeak's attack on Draco
 - Crookshanks eating Scabbers
 - Notion of Snape poisoning Lupin for his job

- Sirius Black
 - Black Wolf Dog (Padfoot)
 - Sirius Brightest star in Canis Major, Big Dog, constellation



- Remus Lupin
 - Remus
 - Cofounder (with twin Romulus) of Rome, left to die, saved by a wolf
 - Lupin
 - Lupus Latin for wolf
- Petunia Flower, anger and resentment
- Lily Flower, innocence


- Crabbe and Goyle
 - Grab and Coil
 - What snakes do
- Albus Dumbledore
 - Albus Latin for white
 - White = good
 - Dumbledore English for bumblebee

- Lucius and Draco Malfoy
 - Lucius Lucifer
 - Draco Dragon
 - Malfoy root "mal" means bad
 - Mal Foi Bad Faith in French

- Gryffindor
 - Griffin French for half eagle-half lion
 - Griffins represent Christ



- Slytherin
 - Mascot is a snake
 - Natural enemy of Griffins
 - Snakes and basilisks represent Satan



Gryffindors and Slytherins: Natural Enemies

- Hippogriff
 - From Ancient Greece and Medieval Legends
 - Half horse / half eagle
 - Symbol of Love



Minerva McGonagall

- Minerva Roman Goddess of Wisdom and War
 - McGonagall
 - Deputy Headmistress
 - Wages war on Voldemort and Death Eaters in The Deathly Hallows (book 7)

Padfoot

- Fictional animal from British folklore
- Extremely large, black wolf-dog
- Glowing eyes
- Associated with death



- Peter Pettigrew
 - Pet-I-Grew
- Quidditch
 - Quaffle, Bludger, Snitch
- Expecto Patronum
 - Latin for "Expect a Protector"
- Avada Kadarva
 - Aramaic phrase meaning "destroy the thing"
 - Aramaic = Extremely old language, believed to be the language of Christ





- Severus Snape
 - Severus Latin for Harsh
 - Snape Means to hurt someone



- Voldemort
 - French phrase "Vol De Mort" means flight from death



- Azkaban Prison: Representative of Alcatraz Prison
 - Most famous secure Federal Prison in American history
 - Located on Alcatraz
 Island, surrounded by harsh waters
 - Housed many of the worst criminals in American history
