

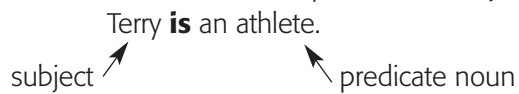

Key Concept: Writers use predicate nouns and predicate adjectives to describe or identify subjects in sentences that contain linking verbs.

Predicate Nouns and Predicate Adjectives

Predicate nouns and **predicate adjectives** can be found in sentences that contain linking verbs. Common linking verbs include forms of the verb *to be* and the verbs *appear, become, feel, grow, look, remain, seem, smell, sound, stay, taste, and turn*.

Predicate nouns rename, identify, or define subjects.



Predicate adjectives describe subjects by telling *which one, what kind, how many, or how much*.
